Middle School

The Year 8 curriculum is designed around engaging students within 8 Key Learning Areas (KLAs). These KLAs are English, Mathematics, Science, Study of Society and Environment, The Arts, Technology, Languages and Health and Physical Education. Within each KLA, student learning is designed, delivered, assessed and reported against Essential Learnings to be completed by the end of Year 9. The Year 9 curriculum design flows seamlessly from Year 8, continuing to address the Essential Learnings through 8 Key Learning Areas. Within Year 9, students begin to influence their own learning through limited selection of courses within some of the KLAs.

Senior School

Year 10 is the first year of senior schooling. Whilst providing greater choice for each student, Year 10 subject offerings are designed to prepare student for Year 11 and 12. In Year 10 students study subjects for one full year.

How Information and Communication Technologies are used to assist learning

Merrimac has an extensive computer network with 578 computers available for staff and students. The school is continually working to bridge the gap of digital learning at home and at school. Most subject areas now publish their learning materials, revision exercises and all assessment tasks on the department's "Learning Place". This enables students to have a uniform digital learning environment. The school also makes extensive use of our website to publish learning materials.

We also use web based curriculum tools such as Mathletics, Clickview, Turn It In and Adobe Suite.

The school has 100% wireless coverage, data projectors in every classroom space and colour printing available to students. All students have their own email and network accounts.

In 2010, we increased the number of laptop computers in the school. Through the Commonwealth Government Digital Education Revolution we rolled out 300 laptop computers to the Year 9 students. This has provided increased access to learning resources for these students.

We are now planning the final roll out of laptop computers to give all students in Years 9 – 12 access to a laptop.

Social climate

The school has an extensive network of support staff who cater for the diverse needs of students. Our support staff comprises a Guidance Officer, School Nurse, Industry Liaison Officer, School Chaplain, Youth Support Co-ordinator, Youth Pathways Officer and Indigenous Liaison Officer.

The school has invested heavily in prevention and intervention in regard to bullying. The school has worked closely with its Peer Mentors in supporting the Year 8 transition to high school.

The school has also worked on training staff to implement the "Putting Youth in the Picture" program for our Year 11 and 12 students.

We are proud of our Special Education Program that supports 57 students to work in mainstream classrooms and grows and develops the individual talents of every child.

Description of how non-attendance is managed by the school

Non-attendance is managed in state schools in line with the DET policies, SMS-PR-029: Managing Student Absences and SMS-PR-036: Roll Marking in State Schools, which outline processes for managing and recording student attendance and absenteeism.

Merrimac SHS strongly supports the government's policy "Every Day Counts". As such we have put in place extra effort to promote students being at school every day. The school takes class rolls every lesson every day. We text message parents by 9.30am each day if their son/daughter has missed the first roll mark. Additionally, we have a well documented process where teachers check if a student misses a lesson. If a student has truanted a lesson during the day, parents are informed by letter and the student is expected to undertake an after school detention. Parents are also sent fortnightly letters if their teenager has unexplained absences.
